## "Minor in Creativity and Expression"

### General description and characteristics of the program

The Department of Visual and Performing Arts is proposing a new minor program in *Creativity* and *Expression* for use in the Essential Education program.

This minor is designed to prioritize creative work and creative communication as its own unique way of knowing and engaging with the world; and to support students for whom creativity provides a personal outlet and/or a strategic pathway towards their professional goals.

This minor is designed as a flexible, interdisciplinary program with courses across Visual & Performing Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences. Students in this minor will take classes that "make and do" and courses that engage critically with topics of arts and culture.

Students selecting this minor may choose to focus within one or two areas or they may choose to take a broad variety of creative courses. Either is a welcome and acceptable pathway within this minor. For example, a student who chooses a narrower focus may choose to take courses in creative writing (HU), popular songwriting (MUS); and critical engagement with literature (HU); while a student who chooses a broader focus may take courses in drawing (ART), material culture (SS); and lighting design (THEA).

#### The minor is:

- 18 credits for students who complete an E3 Experience Course in Category 6A and
- 19 credits for students who choose an upper-level SHAPE Course in Category 6B
- Students who select an upper-level SHAPE course in Category 6B will also complete a 1-credit "Portfolio Requirement."

This minor is designed to meet the requirements of the Essential Education program, and is being submitted with approval from the Essential Ed Implementation Team.

This new minor will be administered by the Department of Visual and Performing Arts (VPA) and will be advised by VPA Academic Advisor. Future changes to the minor requirements will be reviewed and approved by the Essential Education Steering Committee.

#### Rationale

This minor theme was selected as a priority area by campus working groups and aligns with Michigan Tech's current initiatives.

Creative activity improves mental health, long-term brain health, and boosts problem-solving abilities. (Medical News Today, 2018). It is a rising in-demand skill: companies increasingly seek employees who demonstrate flexibility, ingenuity, and out-of-the-box thinking to solve today's complex problems (Forbes, 2024). Students often note that the ability to partner a creative discipline (for example, music) with their major area of study was a deciding factor in their decision to enroll at Michigan Tech. An Essential Education minor in Creativity and Expression opens the door for more students to capitalize on these benefits, earning this credential through courses already required by Essential Education.

## Related programs: within MTU and at other institutions

There are currently no minors on campus that focus on creativity through a holistic, interdisciplinary lens. Individual minors in creative fields exist: art, music composition, theatre (VPA); media production, writing (HU); global and community partnerships (SS). This minor is unique in that it brings together skills and topics across multiple disciplines, affording students the opportunity to tailor their creative work to their unique interests and professional goals.

Other universities who offer programs that connect multiple creative disciplines or partner those disciplines with students' major field study include: The Ohio University, Art and Engineering

Structure; Stanford University, Inter-Arts; Central Michigan University, Public and Applied Liberal Arts; The University of Houston, Interdisciplinary Arts.

Projected Enrollment

Expected annual capacity: 97-117 students, based upon current enrollments in minors across VPA (48) Social Sciences (57), and Humanities (Writing and Media Production, 29).

We anticipate that 20% of students who would typically choose a discipline-specific minor will now choose the EE minor instead ( $134 \times .2 = 27$ ), and that 5% of students choosing EE minors will enroll in this minor ( $1600 \times .05 = 80$ ). We came to this number by estimating that approximately half of Michigan Tech students will choose the EE minor pathway, with 10% of those students selecting this minor in Creativity and Expression. This suggests that 107 students will enroll in this minor each year. We then allowed for a contingency of 10 fewer/ 10 additional students, to create our range of 97-117.

With its wide range of courses and multiple options within each category, this minor can accommodate up to 230-250 students per year without additional resources (personnel, space). We estimated this by assuming a range of 12-20 seats per course. Using that range, there are approximately 600 seats available in both fall and spring semesters, for a total of 1200 seats/AY. If 20% of those seats are anticipated for students in the EE minor, then 240 seats per semester are available for the minor, again allowing for a range of ten fewer/additional students/AY (230-250 students/minor/year).
